David Chandler is a Professor of International Relations at the Department of Politics and International Relations, University of Westminster. He is the founding editor of the Journal of Intervention and Statebuilding, current editor of the journal Resilience: International Policies, Practices and Discourses, founding editor of the Routledge book series Studies in Intervention and Statebuilding and current editor of the Routledge book series' Advances in Democratic Theory and Routledge Studies in Resilience. Professor Chandler is the author of a number of monographs, and has contributed more than one hundred articles to international peer-reviewed journals (in the spheres of international relations, social theory, security, development, democracy, history, geography, political theory, philosophy, ethics and law). For winter semester 2018/2019, prof. Chandler has become a visiting senior researcher at the Institute of Political Studies within the framework of the project "International Mobility of Researchers at Charles University".
